Barrie Hope Shuffler was born on July 27, 1944 in Norfolk, VA to William and Beulah Shuffler (ne Lynches). Barrie attended Nottingham High School in Syracuse, NY and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology where she graduated, one of 18 women, in a class of nearly 1000, in 1966 with a B.S. in Mathematics. Barrie was married June 13, 1965 to Loren Courtland Skinner, II at Temple Concord Syracuse of Syracuse, NY.

Barrie and Court moved to Tempe, AZ in 1966 where Court worked for Motorola and Barrie attended graduate school at Arizona State University to study geology. Pregnant with her 3rd child, Loren C. Skinner, III, Barrie, Heidi, Nicole and Court moved to California in 1970 where she lived for over 47 years.

Barrie worked for a number of companies supplying equipment to the budding integrated circuit manufacturing industry. Despite the barriers to women in this business, she earned the respect of her customers and her competitors. She believed that while the customer was not always right, "the customer was always the customer." Certainly in part due to her efforts as a managing director at Horiba Instruments, her last job, the semiconductor division is their leading business today.

Barrie retired in 2009 to pursue grandmothering full time. She enjoyed traveling, especially in the company of one or more of her five grandchildren. She visited Italy, Paris, Austria, Australia, Cuba and finally Morocco.

Barrie became seriously ill in November, 2016 and was eventually diagnosed with pancreatic cancer to which she succumbed shortly thereafter.
